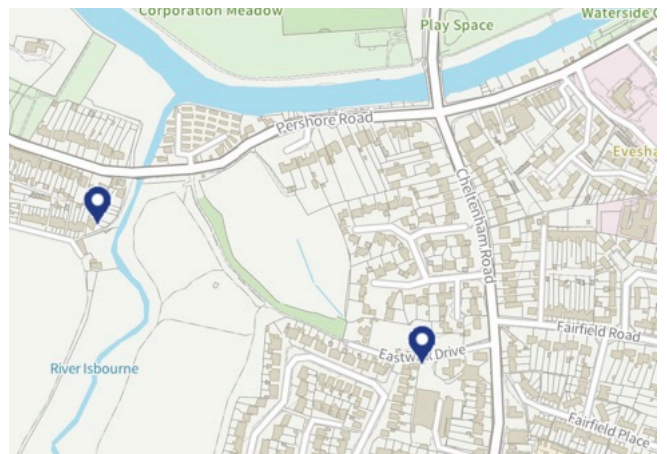
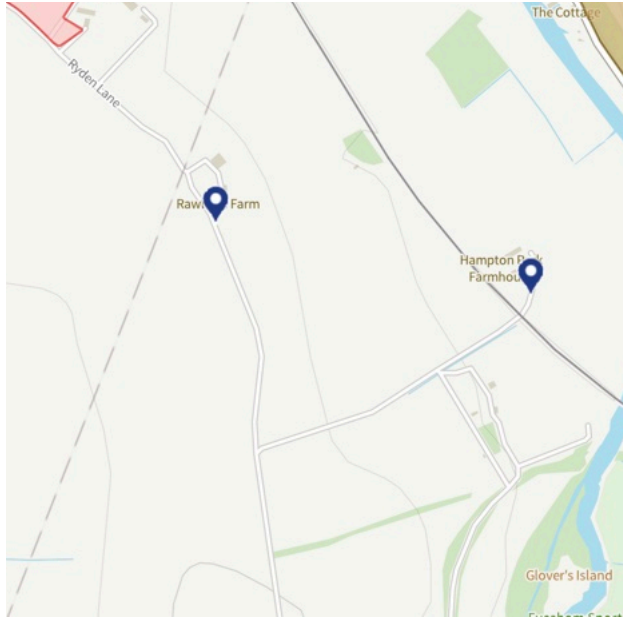

Address Church of St Andrew, Hampton

Grade **II***

Date listed 6 May 1952 amended 23 June 1977

Description:

Parish church of C12 to C15, restored 1903-4 by C.F. Whitcombe.

MATERIALS: Buff limestone in regular blocks, with blue-lias upper courses, graded stone-tile roof.

PLAN: Nave with embraced central tower, lower and narrower chancel, south porch, north transept, and north-east vestry.

EXTERIOR: The church is mainly in Perpendicular style. The nave has three 2-light south windows with Y-tracery under triangular heads. The south porch, which has a stone-slab roof, has pierced spandrels to the triangular-headed entrance, under a straight-headed label with big grotesque stops. The Tudor-headed nave south doorway has foliage spandrels and square label. On the north side the nave has 2 windows similar to the south side, and a doorway with continuous chamfer. C12 masonry incorporating chevron friezes is built into the walls. The tower rises 2 stages above the nave, with polygonal north-east turret, freestone battlements and pinnacles. It has a single small south window in the lower stage, and 2-light belfry openings under straight heads. A war memorial clock face is on the south side. The chancel has diagonal buttresses, and a rebuilt limestone east wall with 3-light window. In the south wall is a straight-headed window to the left, priest's doorway and 2-light window to the right. The north chapel has a 2-light east window, re-set from the north wall of the chancel and similar to the nave windows. The transept has a 2-light north window and west doorway.

INTERIOR: The porch has a pointed tunnel vault on transverse arches. The arched-brace nave roof is 3 bays. Tower arches have continuous hollow chamfers and beneath the tower is a rib vault. The chancel has a 2½-bay arched-brace roof on corbels, with 2 tiers of windbraces. In the south wall is a pointed c1300 piscina. The embrasure of the east window has traces of stencilled foliage. Walls are otherwise whitened rubble stone and incorporate some C12 masonry with chevron friezes. Parquet floors, and mosaic sanctuary floor, are early C20.

PRINCIPAL FIXTURES: The plain round tapering tub font is C12. Benches have moulded edges, probably contemporary with the choir stalls, which have plain moulded ends and open tracery to frontals. The rich Jacobean-style pulpit is by John Clackson of Worcester, of 1893. The simple panelled sanctuary dado incorporates brattishing behind the altar. A memorial tablet to Benjamin Scarlett (d 1739) has entablature and achievement, and is by Richard Squire. Glass by Ward and Hughes includes scenes from the life of Christ in the east window (1859) and tower (c1873), and angels in the north vestry (c1858). The west window of SS Peter, Andrew and Paul, is by Burlison & Grylls (1891), with other windows by Hardman (1902, 1982), William Pearce (1899) and Ray Bradley (1988). A fine late C20 window by

Nicola Hopwood shows a vine growing from a will, symbolising the fruits of a benefaction by John Martin, detailed on an associated board of 1747 under the tower, and whose tomb is in the churchyard.

SUBSIDIARY FEATURES: In the churchyard is a Cotswold-style chest tomb of John Martin (d 1712) (LBS no 147505). The C14-C15 churchyard cross was restored in 1912 by A.M. Durrant (LBS no 147504), who also built the lych gate. Each is separately listed.

HISTORY: A church of C12 origin, of which the font and masonry fragments built into the nave walls survive from this date. The nave and central tower are C15 but they possibly reflect a C12 plan. The chancel was remodelled c1300 under Abbot John de Brokehampton of Evesham. The east wall was re-faced in 1900. The church was restored in 1903-4 by C.F. Whitcombe, who also added the north transept and vestry with organ chamber.

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION: The church of St Andrew, Hampton, is listed at Grade II for the following principal reasons: * It is a well-preserved aisleless Perpendicular church retaining Norman fragments. * Tower base and porch retain C15 vaulting.*

Address Tomb of John Martin, Church of St Andrew, Hampton

Grade II Date listed 23 June 1977

Description:

Circa 1717. Restored. Good stone table tomb with carving of scrolls and cherubs; also a painted and gilded cartouche.

Address 3 Malins Hill Road, Hampton; listed as Cherry Tree Cottage

Grade II Date listed 23 June 1977

Description:

C17. Timber frame and painted brick. Altered and restored. Gabled bay to east with exposed timber frame at sides; 1 storey plus attic; 1 modern casement window and modern multi-paned bow window to ground storey. Modern additions at rear. Thatch.

Address 5 Malins Hill Road, Hampton

Grade II

Date listed 23 June 1977

Description:

C17. Timber frame and painted brick and plaster. Restored; one storey plus attic; 3 eyebrow dormers in thatched roof; plain doorway with modern glazed door; large chimney at east gabled end with restored stack.

Address 10-12 The Pool, Hampton

Grade II

Date listed 23 June 1977

Description:

Late 016-early C17. A much altered range of modest cottages. Stone, partly rendered, and part brick; 2 storeys; generally C19 sash windows. No 11 has stone chamfered 3-light mullioned window, elsewhere windows are altered; plain doorways. Stone and modern tiles. Included for group value.

Nos 10 to 12 (consec) and Nos 15 and 16 form a group.

Address 15 & 16 The Pool, Hampton

Grade II Date listed 23 June 1977

Description:

Late O16-early C17. A much altered range of modest cottages. Stone, partly rendered, and part brick; 2 storeys; generally C19 sash windows. No 11 has stone chamfered 3-light mullioned window, elsewhere windows are altered; plain doorways. Stone and modern tiles. Included for group value.

Nos 10 to 12 (consec) and Nos 15 and 16 form a group.

Address 4,5 & 6 Brookside, Hampton

Grade II

Date listed 23 June 1977

Description:

C17 and later. A modest cottage range, Timber frame with painted or pebble-dashed brick infill. One storey plus attic. Nos 4 and 5 have one and two gabled dormers; elsewhere generally casement windows and plain doorways, that to No 6 with gabled porch. Old and new tiles.

Address 64 Pershore Road, Hampton

Grade II

Date listed 23 June 1977

Description:

C17. A former pair of cottages now combined as a single dwelling. Timber frame with painted brick and stone infill; thatched roof. Single storey plus attic; C19 casement windows and 2 eye-brow dormers; 2 later plain doorways, each with wood porch having thatched pentice.

Address Hampton Manor, Eastwick

Grade II

Date listed 6 May 1952 amended 23 June 1977

Description:

C18. The core probably late C16 or early C17. Red brick; 2 storeys; 5 sash windows with segmental heads and brick arches; 5 dormers with pediments; hipped slate roof. Earlier single-storeyed wing incorporated on west side. Interior has good C18 staircase, panelling throughout ground storey and exposed ceiling beams to 2nd storey.

Date listed 23 June 1977

Description:

Early C19. Stucco; 2 storeys; 4 sash windows; fluted giant pilasters at sides with moulded caps; doorway with Classical porch; bow window at south side, tiered over 2 storeys; bold lined eaves; hipped slate roof.

Address Hampton House

Grade II

Date listed 23 June 1977

Description:

C18 with alterations of circa 1860. The core of the house is much earlier including C16 timber-framed portion with exposed timber frame and ceiling beams internally, and which also incorporates in rear portion, part of a C15 rubble building. C18 stone-faced front; 3 storeys; 6 sash windows; plain pilaster doorcase; parapet with ball-heads. Interior: Apart from earlier features, contains good C18 stair case, and pine panelling throughout ground storey.

Address Rawlings Farmhouse, Hampton

Grade II Date listed 23 June 1977

Description:

Mid C18. Red brick; 2 storeys plus attic; 3 sash windows with plain lintels. Ground storey has a splayed bay window at either side and wood pilaster doorcase at centre with pediment; 3 gabled dormers; old tiles.

Address Hampton Parks Farmhouse, Hampton

Grade II Date listed 23 June 1977

Description:

Late C18. Red brick; 2 storeys plus attic; 3 casement windows (generally lacking frames and glazing bars) with shallow segmental heads; plain wood doorcase; 3 gabled dormers; modern tiles.

Address Friars Mead, Hampton

Grade II

Date listed 6 May 1952

Description:

C17. On site of a C14 building. Timber frame and roughcast brick; 1 storey plus attic; timber-framed gable on right-hand side; 1 casement window; 3 gabled dormers in left-hand portion; gabled modern porch and plain doorway; tiled roof with wrought iron finials on gables. Much modern restoration.
