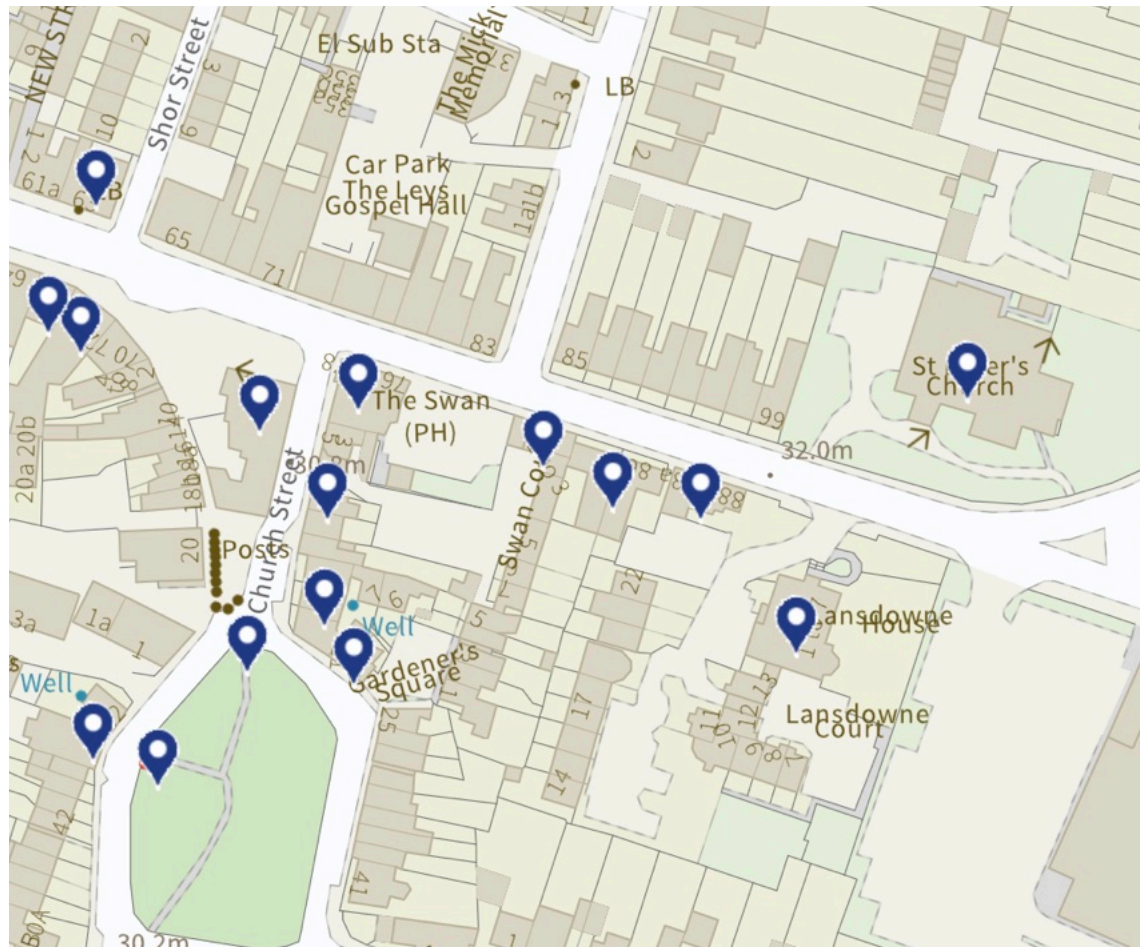
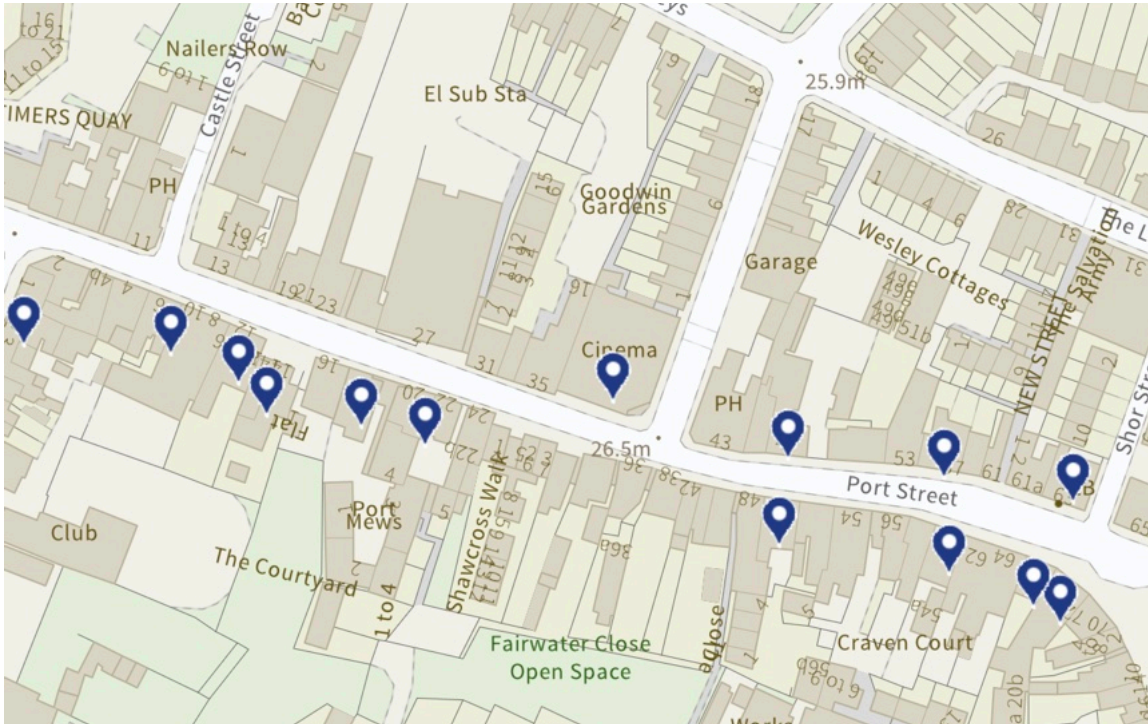

Address 6-10 Port Street

Grade II Date listed 24 June 1977

Description:

Early C18. Engraved stucco; 2 storeys plus attic; 3 sash windows, and 2 casements to No 10; plain eaves; tiles and slates. Late C19 shop fronts with modern glazing.

Nos 6 to 14 (even) and 14A form a group.

Address 12 Port Street; formerly the Woolpack Inn

Grade II Date listed 24 June 1977

Description:

C18 with later alterations. Engraved stucco; 3 storeys; 3 later casement windows, those to ground storey modern; plain doorway with 6-flush-panelled door and later weather hood. Parapet. Included for group value.

Nos 6 to 14 (even) and 14A form a group.

Address 14 & 14a Port Street; formerly Deacle School

Grade II Date listed 24 June 1977

Description:

Early-mid C19. Brick with stuccoed front; 2 storeys; 4 casement windows in moulded architraves with dog-eared angles; plain pilaster doorcase on left-hand side with rectangular fanlight, surmounted by semi-circular head with keyblock and radial fanlight; modillion eaves; hipped slate roof. Projecting bay to ground storey with cornice, open balustrade, and inserted modern shop fronts. Included for group value.

Grade II

Date listed 24 June 1977

Description:

C18 and C19 engraved stucco front; 2 storeys plus attic; 2 sash windows and one later small casement; dentilled eaves; one gabled dormer; tiles. Modern shop front. Included for group value.

Nos 18 to 22 (even) and 22A form a group.

Address 20 Port Street

Grade II Date listed 24 June 1977

Description:

Early C19. Engraved cement and painted brick; 2 storeys plus attic; quoins on left-hand side; 5 sash windows, generally with glazing bars; modillion eaves; one gabled dormer; tiles; square-headed carriage entrance on right-hand side. Modern shop fronts elsewhere. Included for group value.

Nos 18 to 22 (even) and 22A form a group.

Grade II Date listed 24 June 1977

Description:

Early C19. Engraved cement and painted brick; 2 storeys plus attic; quoins on left-hand side; 5 sash windows, generally with glazing bars; modillion eaves; one gabled dormer; tiles; square-headed carriage entrance on right-hand side. Modern shop fronts elsewhere. Included for group value.

Nos 18 to 22 (even) and 22A form a group.

Grade II Date listed 7 May 1952

Description:

Early C18. Red brick; 2 storeys plus attic; 5 sash windows with segmental brick arches; 2 gabled dormers; hipped tile roof. Modern shop front.

Address 50 Port Street

Grade II Date listed 24 June 1977

Description:

C18. Engraved stucco; 3 storeys; 2 sash windows with keyblocks; segmental bow windows to 1st storey; parapet. Late C19 shop front with modern glazing.

Address 53-61 Port Street

Grade II Date listed 24 June 1977

Description:

Late C18 or early C19. Painted stone, No 61 roughcast; 3 storeys; 6 sash windows, generally with glazing bars; plain eaves; slates generally, but some tiles. Later C19 and modern shop fronts.

Nos 53 to 61 (odd) form a group.

Address 58-64 Port Street

Grade II Date listed 7 May 1952

Description:

Early C19 terraced range. Ashlar; 3 storeys; 11 sash windows; ground storey has tripartite windows, and continuous order with fluted enrichments beneath fascia and moulded cornice, part altered to shop front at Nos 58 and 64. Moulded eaves cornice, and blocking course.

Nos 58 to 68 (even) form a group.

Address 63 Port Street

Grade II Date listed 7 May 1952

Description:

C18. Red brick; 3 storeys; 3 sash windows, those to 1st storey Venetian and with a Venetian window on left-hand side of ground storey; altered doorway with plain wood pilasters, and shop front to right, all contained beneath moulded cornice. Parapet.

Address Talbot Inn, 74 Port Street

Grade II Date listed 30 September 1969

Description:

Late C18. Painted brick; three storeys; long and short chamfered quoins at sides; four sash windows with keyblocks and channelled lintels. Ground storey has doorway with segmental head on consoles and modern multi-paned segmental bow window. Rear two-storeyed wing probably C17, with some exposed ceiling beams. Parapet.

Grade II Date listed 24 June 1977

Description:

Early C19. Red brick; 2 storeys; 2 sash windows (single glazing bars only) with keyblocks; modillion eaves cornice; slates. Later C19 doors and shop front. Included for group value.

Nos 58 to 68 (even) form a group.

Address 68 Port Street

Grade II Date listed 24 June 1977

Description:

Early C19. Stucco; 2 storeys; 5 sash windows (3 blocked) with keyblocks and channelled lintels; modillion eaves cornice; slates. Modern shop fronts. Included for group value.

Nos 58 to 68 (even) form a group.

Address 82 Port Street

Grade II Date listed 7 May 1952

Description:

C18. Stone, faced in stucco; 2 storeys plus attic; 6 sash windows in grouped beaded architraves, bull-nosed sills; doorway with hood on brackets and modern door; date-stone at 1st storey with date 1772; square headed carriage entrance on right-hand side. Moulded stone eaves cornice; stone chimney; 3 gabled dormers; slates.

Nos 82 to 86 (even) Lansdowne and former Stables of Lansdowne form a group.

Address 84 & 86 Port Street

Grade II Date listed 6 May 1977

Description:

C18. Red brick; 2 storeys. Each has 3 sash windows with keyblocks and channelled lintels and a doorway with rectangular fanlight and lead canopied hood on wrought iron supports; gabled ends; slates.

Nos 82 to 86 (even) Lansdowne and former Stables of Lansdowne form a group.

Address Lansdowne House, Port Street; listed as Lansdown

Grade II Date listed 30 September 1969, amended 24 June 1977

Description:

Early C19 stuccoed former villa. 2 storeys; fluted Ionic pilasters at sides rising to full height; band; 3 sash windows in moulded architraves, those to ground storey with balconies; moulded wood doorcase with plain rectangular fanlight, side lights, 6-panelled door and Doric portico; moulded eaves cornice, and parapet.

Address Lansdowne Stables, Port Street; listed as Lansdown

Grade II Date listed 30 September 1969, amended 24 June 1977

Description:

Early C19 with later alterations. Red brick. Two 2-storeyed stable pavilions with pediments, each with semi-circular headed recess at 1st storey. The pavilions are now linked by a modern brick single-storeyed central bay.

Address Church of St Peter, Port Street

Grade II Date listed 24 June 1977

Description:

Built 1871-72 by T.D. Barry, with glass by W.H. Constable

MATERIALS: coursed grey lias, with Bath stone dressings, slate roof.

PLAN: asymmetrical plan of aisled four bay nave with transepts, lower and narrower chancel, south tower and spire, south-east organ chamber and vestry, and north vestry.

EXTERIOR: the church is in Decorated style. The three stage tower has diagonal buttresses, with gable offsets. The south doorway, opening into a porch, has ballflower decoration in the arch. The second stage has a two-light west window, and two narrow cusped lancets in south and east faces. Triple belfry windows have transoms and cusped tracery lights, below a tall broach stone spire with lucarnes, partly obscured by clock faces. The south aisle has two-light windows. There is only a modest west front. The nave has a west doorway with two orders of nook shafts with foliage capitals, and four-light west window. Angle buttresses have gabled caps. The clerestory has two-light windows. Transepts have four-light south and north windows, and the north transept also has a two-light east window. The chancel has diagonal buttresses, five-light east window and two two-light north windows. The organ chamber has a trefoil-headed doorway, two-light south and east windows, and modern brick stack set back from the east wall. On the north side is a double-gabled vestry, with low addition to the north-west.

INTERIOR: nave arcades have round piers of polished Westmorland granite, octagonal foliage capitals and double-chamfered arches. The nave has a six bay arched-brace roof and subsidiary closely spaced scissor rafters. Transepts have trussed rafter roofs. The Decorated chancel arch has an inner order on corbelled shafts with stiff-leaf capitals. In the chancel is a canted boarded ceiling painted blue, with gilded moulded ribs. A corbelled piscina is on the north side, and on the south side are two sedilia under ogee heads with central serpentine polished marble shaft. Walls are plastered. The floor is laid with boards, except for tiles in the porch below the tower, and at the east end of the nave.

PRINCIPAL FIXTURES: two important monuments in the south transept and other fixtures were brought from the old church. A Renaissance wall monument to Thomas Watson (d 1561) is framed by Ionic columns, foliage entablature, and pediment with skull. A large Baroque monument to John Deacle (d 1709) is attributed to Francis Bird. The deceased is shown as a full-length reclining figure on a sarcophagus, below an inscription on a drapery panel framed by pilasters, broken pediment and achievement. Other wall monuments are to Mrs Frances Watson (d 1727) and William Acton (d 1817). The font has a round bowl on an octagonal stem and base, is probably C14 or C15 and was brought here from the old church in 1917. Two pointed boards with Commandments, Lord's Prayer and Creed are fixed to the

east wall. Other fixtures are 1872 or later. The polygonal pulpit of Caen stone is on a pedestal with detached marble shafts, and has heads of Christ and SS Peter and John. Choir stalls of 1926 by Sprague & Evans have Gothic blind-tracery ends. A rood beam was erected in 1934, with rood figures by Alec Miller of Chipping Campden. The stone reredos has cusped arches with relief foliage and angels over the spandrels. There are many stained glass windows, four of 1872 by W.H. Constable of Cambridge, including the east window. Other windows include, in the chancel, Adoration of the Magi by Wippell & Co (1921), and Presentation in the south aisle, by Curtis, Ward and Hughes (1903). Three aisle windows are by Albert Lemmon (1889-1963) of the Bromsgrove Guild, showing Joseph (1937), legend of the founding of Evesham (1954) and Good Shepherd and Good Samaritan.

SUBSIDIARY FEATURES: in the churchyard is an octagonal Perpendicular font bowl with quatrefoils. On the south and east sides facing Port Street is a stone wall and gate piers, with iron railings and gates.

HISTORY: the church was built 1871-72 by T.H. Barry (1815-1905), architect of Liverpool, at a cost of £4500. It replaced an earlier church on a different site that was considered beyond repair, but many fixtures were moved from the old church to the new. Glass for the new church was supplied by W.H. Constable of Cambridge, and coloured glass in the transept windows by Thomas Holt of Liverpool. The north-west vestry was added in 1912-13 by C.E. Bateman and G.H. Hunt, extended 1991-92 by Patrick J. Burton, architect of Evesham.
